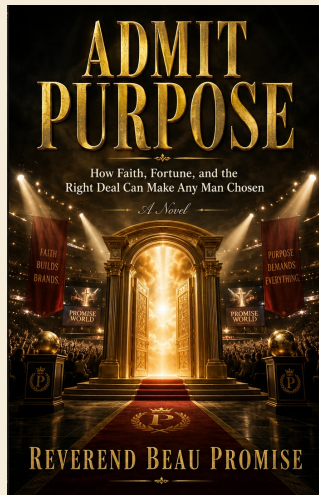




ADMIT PURPOSE

Reading Group Host Guide

Facilitation agreements and 60-, 90-, and 120-minute plans without an approved interpretation.

A reading resource for the novel by Chris Aidan. Reverend Beau Promise and Promise World are fictional.

A good purpose should survive a question.

Discussion agreements

- Begin with evidence from the novel before moving to analogy.
- Do not require personal disclosure.
- Separate what a character wants from whether the character is correct.
- Allow Beau's genuine gifts to remain visible.
- Name the person when language becomes abstract.
- Distinguish allegation, policy, consequence, and moral interpretation.
- Use spoiler controls honestly.
- End with an unresolved question.

60 minutes

- 5 min - Spoiler level and boundaries
- 10 min - One scene where Beau is effective
- 20 min - Three questions from one theme
- 15 min - One Who Paid? system
- 10 min - Does Beau change?

90 minutes

- 10 min - Agreements and first reactions
- 15 min - Voice, comedy, and tire shop
- 25 min - Promise family map
- 20 min - One institutional system
- 15 min - Ending and cursor
- 5 min - Unanswered questions

120 minutes

- 10 min - Boundaries
- 20 min - Voice and satire
- 25 min - Family as institution
- 20 min - Break and worksheet
- 25 min - Named human costs
- 15 min - Confession and next platform

- 5 min - What is the door?

When the room becomes difficult

- Return to the exact scene.
- Ask what each character wants before asking who is correct.
- Name the person whenever the language becomes abstract.
- Do not demand agreement about Beau's degree of change.
- Ask what evidence would alter each view.

Closing question

Does Beau become more honest, or only more skilled at packaging honesty?
